Top 5 Hazardous Waste Violations and Penalty Violations

CT- Ross Bunnell

Top 5 from \$ penalty actions, listed by frequency of occurrence

- 1. No inspection programs/written/with log
- 2. No determination of hazardous waste
- 3. No personnel training
- 4. No hazardous waste accumulation date no date on containers
- 5. No secondary containment and no firm working surface

Penalties for the violations listed above, listed respectively

- 1. \$858
- 2. \$3273
- 3. \$9820
- 4. \$960
- 5. \$6100

NH- Bob Bishop/Linda

Top 5 Violations by frequency of occurrence

- 1. Lack of training plan
- 2. Open containers
- 3. Satellite accumulation area not at or near point of generation
- 4. Hazardous waste determination, i.e. waste rags w/F001-F005 listed solvents
- 5. Labeling containers: No hazardous waste label, no hazardous waste code No label of the contents

NH (cont'd)

NH Top Penalties Administrative

1.	Hazardous waste training	\$1000-\$1750/pp	
2.	Hazardous waste determination	\$1500/determine	
3.	Inspection (weekly)	\$1000/inspection / cap\$17,000	
4.	Disposal	\$2000/ event	
5.	Labeling containers,	\$600/containers (55+ gallons)	
	Hazardous waste	\$300/containers (<55 gallon)

Waste code

NJ – Mike Hastey

Minimum \$4,500 – max. \$50,000 (but legislature imposed a grace period system) \$800,000 (?)/yr collected in penalties, 100 penalty cases /yr.

Top 5- violations cited

- 1. Labeling as hazardous waste
- 2. Labeling with date
- 3. Emergency coordinator info
- 4. Fail to inspect
- 5. Fail to make arrangements with local authorities

NJ High Priority violations w/penalties

- 1. Hazardous waste determinations
- 2. Failure to minimize potential for release, fire, explosion
- 3. Satellite Accumulation Area- failure to mark or post signs
- 4. Failure to label containers
- 5. Release of hazardous substance

NY - Tom Killeen

Top 5 citations

- 1. Waste accum. area violations: open containers, no markings
- 2. Universal waste containers
- 3. Universal waste labeling
- 4. Written comm. prior to use of transporter
- 5. Written comm. prior to use of TSDF

NY (cont'd)

Top 5 Penalty Violations

- 1. Waste accumulation issues
- 2. Determinations
- 3. Failure to familiarize local authorities (fire, police, etc.)
- 4. Sole source aguifer protection issues
- 5. Storage limit timeframe exceedance, operating as TSDF

Typically collect about \$1 - 2.5 million /yr.

VT – Tom Benoit

Only 3 to 4 penalty cases per year

- 1. Inventory/inspection failure
- 2. Unlabeled Satellite Accumulation Areas
- 3. Failure to determine
- 4. Used oil, unlabeled
- 5. Signage- failure to post signage in storage areas

Maine – Mike Hudson

Top 5 hazardous waste violations

- 1. Failure to label containers as Hazardous Waste
- 2. Failure to keep containers closed
- 3. Failure to determine
- 4. Failure to inspect daily and record in a log
- 5. Failure to store containers on firm working surface

Top 5 penalty violations in 2006

1.	Hazardous waste discharge -	\$5,000-\$19,000
2.	Failure to determine -	\$2,000-\$5,000
3.	Fail to have hazardous waste contingency plan -	\$2,000 - 2,500
4.	Fail to provide/document hazardous waste training	\$2,000
5.	Storage greater than 90 days	\$1500 - \$4000

Past 10 years, 82 penalty cases; Past 3 yrs, 23 penalties (about 8 penalty cases /yr) Average \$22,500 Range \$4,000-\$540,000

Maine: 4 criminal convictions in court for hazardous waste cases 1 federal criminal case by EPA with ME DEP assistance
